How did you do with the law?

In Need of Saving

The speaker at our September meeting was Howard Driver from the Wharfedale Fell Rescue and he proved to be very interesting. We learned that the group was formed in 1948 and is based in a purpose-built centre in Grassington. They have 60 active volunteer members who are on-call 24/7, 365 days a year to rescue humans and animals who get into trouble on the fells and in the caves of the area from Upper Wensleydale to the AI, Skipton and Malham. We learned that it was a prerequisite to enjoy getting wet as, by the nature of the work, most rescues involve poor weather or wet caves!! The group uses rescue dogs who are trained to find anyone sitting or lying on the ground. They are most frequently used for nighttime searches and they also have to be happy to fly (in a helicopter)! Due to the increasing frequency of flooding in the area, they now have a new Swift Water Rescue Team, specifically trained and fully equipped to undertake rescues in flood waters.

The service operates in tandem with the Police, Fire and Ambulance services and can only be called out by the Police when a 999 call is made that indicates their help would be useful. If deemed necessary, a call is also put into the Air Ambulance service to assist. We were quite surprised to learn that because this service is no longer provided by the RAF, the air ambulances are obliged to abide by Civil Aviation Rules which means that it is not possible to take sharp objects or liquids onto the aircraft!! Very odd, considering that both are probably crucial to the efforts to save someone's life!

All in all, this was a fascinating talk and we were all very grateful to hear of the marvellous work that these volunteers provide across our area.

Visit to York Cookery School

Thanks to his work, Andrew gets to travel the world, having been to Milan, Beirut and China and shortly off to work in Dubai! So, after a wonderful day of food and entertainment, everyone came home with 'goodie bags' of chocolates and beautifully iced cookies.
