It had been a *very* cold day but we were well



#### **Trip to Ripon Cathedral**


14 members joined for lunch at the Foresters in Carlton in Coverdale. There was a good choice on the menu and we all enjoyed a really lovely meal.

## SAME PROBLEMS; DIFFERENT SCENERY

Thank goodness, the better weather appears to have arrived and now that the clocks have changed, we are looking forward to longer days, hopefully filled with a bit more sunshine and eventually warmth.

If we are lucky enough to have made it to the end of winter, I think we have done pretty well this year, although I may be a bit premature with that thought. Yes, we did have snow, but nothing too awful and it hasn't been too cold - at least not for long periods. That is a blessing for us all, given the high cost of heating our homes at the moment!

This month, I thought I might write a bit about a recent surprise trip I had 'down south' which was lovely but which made me really grateful to get home to Wensleydale.

In a miraculous turn of events, my husband surprised me with a weekend away - details of which he would not divulge in advance. I tried really hard to find out details on the basis that I needed to know in order to pack the right clothing - it didn't work!! He gave nothing away! I started to think he had undergone a personality change!!

Anyway, on the day we were due to sally forth, we woke to several inches of snow! Yes, it looked glorious but I was determined we would be nuts to venture out of the Dales in such weather, more for fear of not getting back in again. However, I was told in no uncertain terms that we were definitely going away as we needed a break - that much was true!

So, in the afternoon, I finally packed a case, covering all manner of eventualities (as I usually do!) and we set forth for 'foreign' climes.

Despite my reservations about the stupidity of this trip in the weather conditions, by the time we reached the A1, there was not a flake of snow in sight! Indeed, aside from a light flutter somewhere around Nottingham, we didn't see any more of the white stuff, which was a relief. Mind you, I had packed enough warm clothes, wellies and supplies to cope with spending the weekend snowed in the car on the A1, so I did feel a bit stupid!

Now, given that my husband has not really driven far since pre-Covid days, and certainly not headed south for many years, he did amazingly well to get us 'down south' without incident. Of course, by the time we arrived there, it was dark and there was no chance at all of me having any clue as to where we might be. So, it was a real joy to stop and find a good friend of mine from primary school days helping me out of the car.

Suffice to say, we had a lovely weekend, catching up on our respective family news and tossing around our thoughts of the modern world. However, the overriding message we came back with was that we did not wish to linger too long 'down south' and were horrified at how life is so different there.

Obviously, there are less open spaces, although we did have a walk through a very nice park where children were feeding ducks. Aside from that though, everywhere was built upon. Of course we expected that to be the case, being so close to London, but what we didn't really expect was just how much money you needed to buy any of these properties. -

If we thought it was hard here for our youngsters to buy their own home and stay in the Dales, you should hear what it is like in the southern counties. Oh my goodness! We were taken for a walk around what has to be said was a very nice area of the town we were staying in (St Albans), where we saw a range of housing stock dating from early 20th century properties to modern developments. The really horrifying thing was that we found there were very few (if any) on the market for less than £900,000/£1 million! We even saw a very nice early 20th century bungalow for sale, set in a nice garden which was on the market for £900,000 but not to be lived in - oh no, that was to buy the property and then demolish the bungalow and build a modern house! Just imagine how much that project would cost!

I know it is all relative and I work on the basis that most people in the south earn more than those in the north, but nevertheless it must be almost impossible for youngsters to get their feet on the property ladder there when prices are just so out of reach. So, my friend is now facing the dilemma that her children (now settled with partners and families) will have to move away at some point in order to find a home big enough.

I guess perhaps that indicates that we all have similar problems but the scale is somewhat varied across the country.

Anyway, after all my stressing about the weather, we had a nice break but had no temptation to linger any longer and headed back to the Dales with great enthusiasm, refreshed and ready to face the everyday challenges that we all suffer with, but sometimes get out of perspective when we have nothing to compare them against.

I feel really blessed to be living in such a fantastic place and yes, my children will find it hard to get on the property ladder but I am hopeful that they may stand a slightly better chance than the youngsters living 'down south'. So, is there a north/south divide? Well, you tell me. In my opinion, there is, and always has been, but it doesn't mean that we don't all have the same problems - just that the scale is different.
