### **Travelling Romania with Janine**

Our very own Janine gave us a talk for our May meeting about her visits to Romania, and was able to visualise this for us via her photographs over the 'Zoom' platform.

What a lovely place it appeared to be! Janine's husband, David, had been visiting Romania in his role with the YDNPA, looking at agriculture and how practices could be shared. Janine joined him on some of his trips and whilst he was busy working, she was enjoying herself exploring the area.

They stayed with a Romanian family in a rural village called Garbovita. The houses there were very colourful on the outside, many painted blue, and most people were engaged in farming and were from the older generation. The cities seem to attract the youngsters, whilst the older people remain in the countryside. Everyone has at least one dog which, traditionally, was to protect them against attack from wolves, bears and wild boar! Buying food from supermarkets is apparently quite expensive, hence many people grow their own and share it amongst others in their villages - what a lovely idea!

The rural landscape is very open and mainly grassland and during the ten days of Janine's



visit the temperature was around 33 degrees during the day, so it was quite brown and extremely dry, with areas of cracked soil visible. People tended to cook and eat outside, enjoying the fresh air. Despite this outdoor style of living, Janine told us that it was a very rare thing to see people out walking in the countryside and certainly not women on their own, although this may change with plans to try and increase tourism following receipt of a European grant to make the area more appealing for visitors. Part of these plans include creating footpaths, and advice on how to do this is being sought from the YDNPA.

Janine spent a lot of time exploring the area and in particular an open air museum where there were replica houses in different styles, including many with thatched roofs. She was fascinated by the way posts and fences



were decorated with a variety of patterns carved into them. Whilst there weren't many flowers to be seen generally, it was noticeable that outside the

churches there were plenty, and many were the type of varieties we see in this country. We saw photographs of some amazing handdecorated tiles inside the churches which

w e r e intricate a n d beautiful. Colour is clearly popular here!



Janine took a visit to the nearby city of Alba Lulia where there are lots of open spaces

and also lots of bronze statues of people which were very popular for visitors to have their photos taken with. Interestingly, Janine told us that every manhole cover in the city has a map of



the city on it, which is something I doubt our highways authorities would even consider!

Whilst Janine did not know a word of Romanian when she first visited the country, she has been learning, and told us that she is now able to read many more words, although she is not so good at speaking it! Apparently, it is a very difficult language to learn! In the countryside, Romanian is the language of choice, but in the towns and cities, many of the younger people speak English. We saw photographs of local people in their traditional dress which they wear for special occasions, although generally they are like the rest of us and wear jeans and T-shirts. Janine bought

herself a traditional Romanian blouse which is intricately decorated.

During her visit, Janine joined a willow weaving basket workshop, run by men in the village. Unlike willow weaving in this country where the willow is soaked to keep it flexible, in Romania they harvest it freshly to weave and therefore there is no need to soak it, although they do occasionally dip it in water in order to work it more easily.

We were all fascinated to hear that there are lots of roadworks in Romania but that they have one of the fastest internet connections in Europe - lucky them! Of course, for many years they were ruled by Communism but, slowly, that is all changing and life is now very different. Janine told us that they are trying to set up a library in the village where she stayed and they are wanting a supply of English children's books, so if you have any going spare, please give them to Janine who can find them a good home.

All in all, this was a really interesting talk, accompanied by some lovely photographs and clearly, Romania is somewhere we can perhaps consider visiting in the future—when we are allowed! We did think that Janine could lead us on a guided visit there, but she told us her Romanian was nowhere near good enough! Anyway, thanks Janine for an interesting evening.
