Woodland Trust - Snaizeholme

Our lovely speaker from October, David Mason, has been in touch regarding the questions you asked, here is what he says:

I've had responses from Woodland Trust colleagues to my presentation questions and they are, as follows:

1) For those wanting free trees to create or expand a community woodland, then, as previously mentioned, go to our website and use this link:

- 2) The corrugated sheets at the 'top' of the Snaizeholme valley (close to Cam Road) might not be on our land, but aren't known to our Site Manager
- 3) The big question about Wool Logs (for peatland restoration) had a detailed answer, so I've included it (below) for you.

I hope that's everyone catered for, if not send me more!!!

Wool Logs in Peat Restoration

The Woodland Trust has pushed to experiment with wool logs on our peatland, as we really wanted to find a way to support local industry. However there were 2 main issues on top of those highlighted below.

- 1 Up until now, they have proved less effective than the coir rolls; as witnessed by Alec Pue (WT Site Manager) on a recent site visit. Not holding/filtering the water as efficiently, nor do they get absorbed into the landscape the same, with vegetation seemingly not to grow on them like the coir. YPP trials are trying to work on the design of how these are 'baled' up and have a few ideas that may help, but it is early days.
- 2 The funding that we were fortunate to get to support the work (Nature For Climate) doesn't recognise wool logs as a legitimate intervention so would not fund their use.

Wool logs (extract)

In spring 2024, we (YPP) started a year-long trial of wool logs as an alternative to the coir logs we currently use. If successful, this would create a market for what is generally regarded as a waste product; it would also minimise the carbon miles in our restoration. We need to establish whether wool logs remain stable enough to do the job, as previous trials have shown problems with the material's structural integrity once wet. There's also concern around whether wool will leach nitrates into the peat, which would be a problem in such a low nutrient habitat. Until we have satisfied ourselves on these issues, we cannot commit to widespread deployment of wool logs.
